The Amy Winehouse Foundation

The Amy Winehouse Foundation delivered an extended assembly to Year 9 students based around their drug and alcohol prevention work. Trained volunteers will be working with students in Ethics lessons this term to deliver follow up workshops for students. Students heard from an accredited volunteer about his own experiences of substance misuse and recovery and it is by putting real life experiences at the heart of education that makes the programme so effective. Students were interested to hear how the presenter had overcome personal issues to live a substance free life and how he works to empower others to make informed choices.

In Ethics lessons, students will engage in discussions about their feelings, thoughts and behaviours to enable them to address issues such as low self-esteem, body image, racism and bullying without turning to drugs or alcohol.

The foundation were extremely complementary about how engaged our students were throughout their session and how they were a credit to the academy.

Chelsea's Choice

Our Y8 students watched 'Chelsea's Choice', a renowned, engaging and powerful theatre performance highlighting the serious and emotional issue of child sexual exploitation, as part of their Ethics lesson. Students gained an understanding of the devastating impact on the character, Chelsea, of being exploited by an older male who took control of her life, as well as gaining skills and knowledge to protect themselves from this form of abuse.

The play told the story of a girl called Chelsea who was a 15 year old girl who, having fallen out with her friends and family, met a man called Gary. Unfortunately Gary was not what he seemed to be! Chelsea's story unfolded and afterwards our students talked with the actors and discussed what happened to Chelsea and how it could have been prevented.

Students displayed impeccable behaviour throughout the play and workshop, making valuable contributions to the discussion. They have been unanimous in their appreciation of the

piece and the messages around safe internet use and healthy relationships. All students received an information leaflet after the performance giving them advice on how to keep themselves and their friends safe.



World Book Day

The Beast from the East could not stop Brinsworth Academy celebrating World Book Day, a week after the official date!

The aim of the day is to celebrate and to encourage discussion about the importance of reading. Studies show that reading makes a big difference to a young person's educational performance. Reading results in a wider vocabulary, greater general knowledge and gives us an insight into the world views of others. Recent research suggests it can improve empathy, relationships with others and improve mental well-being.

On 8th March, the English department persuaded staff from across the academy to dress up as characters from well known books; even the senior leadership team joined in! Students enjoyed seeing the Mad Hatter, Stick Man, Willy Wonka, Cruella DeVille and Tin Tin walking round the site.

This year was the first time we have marked World Book Day at Brinsworth Academy, but it will certainly not be the last!







Inspire Week

During Inspire Week in January, groups of students from Years 9, 11 and 12, with aspirations of going onto Higher Education, enjoyed a range of engaging workshops, which were delivered by ambassadors from Sheffield Hallam University. On the 23rd January, 80 Year 9 students took part in a 'Zombie Apocalypse' session. As part of our raising aspirations programme, students were able to experience the team building event, whilst researching and gaining knowledge in a number of careers and skills. Students are now able to explain career pathways and post 16 and 18 options. Year 12 found the 'Why go to university?' session extremely informative. As we would expect, students involved conducted themselves in a mature and responsible manner in all of the sessions. We are looking forward to supporting our Year 12s with their UCAS (university) applications when they return to Year 13 in September.

Buddhism Workshop Y7 Ethics

As part of the Year 7 Ethics programme of study, we have had the pleasure of having 2 visitors from the Sheffield Buddhist Centre in to talk to students about the Buddhist faith. Members from the Buddhist Centre have been visiting our Academy for several years now and students always enjoy the opportunity to ask questions to the Buddhists, along with the opportunity to participate in a 'Guided Relaxation'.

These workshops were then followed up with a unit called 'Healthy Mind' where students have learnt about strategies to deal with stress and stay calm.

Let us take the unwanted shoes off your hands (or feet!) and rehome them in rural Africa where they will be loved once more.



Numeracy Celebration

On the 31st January we held our first Numeracy Celebration of this academic year. This event involved a group of year 7 and year 8 students who had successfully completed one of the numeracy intervention programmes we run as an Academy.

Parents/carers were invited to join the students as we recognised the success and progress they had made through the completion of these.

During the event the students were given the opportunity to show the work they had produced throughout the programmes. Parents/carers and some year 11 students were then invited to spend time participating in a number of activities involved in these interventions, while refreshments were being served.

Anne Birch, Vice-Principal of the Academy, presented the students with certificates, recognising their achievements and motivating the students to continue to build on the progress they had made.

Discover US.

Discover US is an aspiration-raising programme, delivered by the University of Sheffield, for students in Y9-11 who have the potential to access Higher Education but do not have a family tradition of going to University. Students apply in Year 9 and if successful they begin the 3-year programme based around the five university faculties: Social Sciences, Arts & Humanities, Science, Engineering, and Medicine, Dentistry & Health. Students take part in mini lectures, subject tasters and explore different courses and careers. Students have been extremely positive about their experiences and have described how the programme has helped them to develop confidence, problem solving skills and helped them improve how they interact and work with others.

Our Year 9 students, Aidan Poultney, Safa Mahmood, Cameron Hewitt, Sophie Ditcher, Cloe Asher and Alizeh Aamir, have just started on their journey on Discover US with an introduction to the campus and activities to discover how university is different to school. Three of the students, Aidan, Cloe and Sophie, were presented with 'Star Student' awards for speaking with confidence and presenting to an audience with skill.

Sunder Singh-Bal, in Year 10, was identified, during a recent Discover US activity day, as being the 'Star Student' for being a 'Money Master' and getting involved in all of the student finance and budgeting activities.



Our Year II students will successfully 'graduate' this term at a celebration evening with their parents and staff from the academy. During the early hours of a cold, rainy day in February, excitement and anticipation filled the air as we began our annual Sixth Form trip to New York. Students were plunged into a five-day packed itinerary, experiencing the vibrant city scape of what seemed so familiar from films and TV, yet alien in reality.

One of the main highlights was witnessing the stunning views of Manhattan, set against clear skies, from the iconic Rockefeller observation deck. Students were able to see the Empire State Building and all of the incredible views over Manhattan in sunlight, dusk and at sunset, allowing for clear views over visited attractions, such as Central Park and down as far as the Statue of Liberty and its surrounding waters. In the grand scheme of things, everything looked miniature.

Experiencing the 9/11 memorial and Ground Zero museum was a sobering experience. The impressive marble falls, Freedom Tower, exhibitions and illustrations gave everyone time to reflect and pause for thought. Emotion during this experience was felt by all and students displayed great understanding and empathy.

The Manhattan Skyline transformed into a panoramic photograph as we took the morning cruise out to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island. Exploration began instantly, climbing the 354 steps of the Statue of Liberty to reach views out along the Hudson River to witness the location of the 12 million immigrants who entered America through Ellis Island. After disembarking in Battery Park, we made our way through New York's financial district, where we managed to capture group shots in front of the iconic 'Charging Bull' and the 'Fearless Girl' Bronze Statue on Wall Street (temporarily installed International women's day which represents women's rights and gender equality).

In order to get an insight into the busy New York lifestyle, students had the opportunity to take the subway when travelling uptown or downtown Manhattan, as well as eat from street vendors offering remarkable fast food and explore the huge array of shops on 5th Avenue. Students also had the opportunity to eat at the Tick Tock Diner where they could experience American dining first hand with pancakes, waffles, burgers and so much more. To add to the enormous range of experiences offered on our trip to the city that never sleeps, students experienced a nail biting basketball game between the Brooklyn Nets and New Orleans Pelicans at the renowned Barclays centre, Brooklyn.



Students glided across the ice at the iconic Wollman Rink in Central Park, and experienced navigating their way around the city. Many hired bikes and some took a stroll to explore and grasp the vastness of their surreal yet splendid location independently. Following on from this, the final day offered students an exciting opportunity to explore behind the scenes at the United Nations Headquarters, where students had the chance to see the main conference rooms and the General Assembly Hall.

Overall, students experienced a fine balance between education and leisure in the city that never sleeps; an experience they will never forget. Plans for the 2019 New York trip are in motion and students currently in Y11/Y12 will receive initial interest letters in the coming weeks, prior to May half term.
