Commedia Dell'Arte

A comedic style of theatre. It originated in Italy in the 15th Century, performed often in town squares by travelling performers. All actors wore

masks and outfits to represent a character.



Stock Character

A set of characters that appear in every performance of a certain style.
E.g. In Pantomime you always have a Dame, Villain, Principle Boy and Damsel in distress.

Pantomime



A comedic style of performance. It originates from Commedia Dell'Arte and includes stock characters and songs,

dance and audience participation.



Arlecchino

A servant that is dim-witted but schemes to get his way.



Pierrot

The sad clown that is fooled by others.

He is usually heartbroken



Dame

A character in Pantomime that the audience know is a man dressed as a woman. Costume is bright, cheerful and fun for comedy purposes



Il Dottore

The drunk Doctor that creates fake illnesses for money and exaggerates the outcome



Columbina

The maid to a rich lady, intelligent but likes rich gentlemen.



The Villain

The Villain will do all they can to stop the good character from reaching their end goal



Lazzi

An improvised scene in Commedia Dell'Arte



Improvisation

A performance that follows a brief, but is made up without rehearsal



Principle Boy

The lead male character, in Pantomime, this is sometimes played by a woman.

The male character is usually the Prince of the story (Prince Charming) or the Lead itself (Aladdin)



Exaggeration

Skills are made to look over the top for comedy purposes



Melodrama

When the action and reaction is exaggerated for effect



Damsel (in Distress)

Usually the Princess of the story. The Damsel is usually the one that needs saving
